LET'S TALK ABOUT DOCUMENTATION

Documentation can be in many different forms. In this *Teacher Talk*, we discuss tips for easy documentation approaches in regard to experiences and curriculum.

The Early Education Coaches' Tips:

1. Carry around index cards, sticky notes, or a piece of paper that can fit in your pocket for quick notes.
2. Photos will be your best friend! Take pictures to capture moments of wonder and exploration. See if you can take a picture from the child's angle.
3. Along with pictures, try to capture the child's words.
4. Plan for which child you will observe!
