

Moving away from 'Good Job'

Our use of 'Good Job' can make children more dependent on approval from others, rather than building their confidence. Read more here!

Tips to turn it around:

- Be specific in your feedback: "You used both hands to cover your paper in blue paint!"
- Focus on what children are doing, not the outcome:
 "You are working so hard together to build that ramp."
- Switch to 'Thank you for...' When a child does something you appreciate, try saying 'thank you for putting your coat away'.
- Or ask a question instead! *How did you balance all of those blocks? That looks tricky!*

oose Parts Play



At Ellis Early Learning, teachers are offering **loose** parts to their toddler classes for open-ended exploration and play. Instead of a teacher-directed activity where each child makes the same product, in loose parts play children take the lead to explore the materials, figure out how the fit and work together, and make discoveries. On the left, children explored pipe cleaners, cardboard tubes, wooden spools. Below, they used foam tubes and balls to create ramps and pathways.

What loose parts do you have in your classroom or center? Have you tried setting up an invitation with loose parts, then observing what ideas children have with the materials?

When children explore loose parts through open-ended play, they are learning LANGUAGE, SOCIAL SKILLS, SCIENTIFIC INQUIRY, MATH CONCEPTS, and fostering their CREATIVITY.



Give loose parts play a try!

Try starting a loose parts collection in your classroom. Invite families to contribute materials, and display them in containers so children can see what is available to create and explore.
